### **Narratives**

### **Mitigation Needs Assessment:**

Within 4 years, 3 major storms have impacted the State of South Carolina, causing immense damage and several casualties. In October 2015, the state was devastated by over 20 inches of rainfall from an extratropical storm worsened by nearby Hurricane Joaquin, which caused significant flooding and storm damage throughout the state. A year later, Hurricane Matthew entered the state near McClellanville, South Carolina as a Category 1 Hurricane, unleashing strong winds and torrential rainfall throughout the eastern part of the state. Most recently, in September 2018, Hurricane Florence made landfall just north of South Carolina in Wrightsville Beach, North Carolina. While North Carolina experienced the worst of the storm, South Carolina suffered from heavy rainfall and flooding from the downriver watersheds shared with North Carolina. The effects of these storms will be felt for decades.

Despite advances in meteorology, it's impossible to know where a storm and its accompanying damage will exactly hit until it's often too late. However, we are able to identify and model the flood risk an area faces. Damage from these storms was not equally distributed. 30 out of 46 counties in South Carolina received CDBG-DR assistance from one of these three storms. 5 of these counties suffered damage from all three major storms. Most of the damage was centralized around the Pee Dee and Santee Watersheds. Having suffered through so many storms in a short period, South Carolina is striving to preemptively prevent or minimize future, avoidable damage. The State will focus its Mitigation efforts on counties within these regions in order to maximize the Mitigation Grant's benefits for South Carolinians.

### **Proposed Use of Funds:**

In 2018, Congress passed Public Law 115-123, which awarded \$12 billion to previous CDBG-DR grant recipients that were impacted by disasters from 2015 to 2017. Of this award, South Carolina is designated to receive \$157,590,000 in mitigation funds for the Most Impacted and Distressed (MID) counties from the 2015 Severe Storm disaster (Public Law 114-113) and the MID counties from the 2016 Hurricane Matthew disaster (Public Law 114-254). Additionally, Richland County will receive \$21,864,000, Lexington County will receive \$15,185,000, and the City of Columbia will receive \$18,585,000 in mitigation funds as a result of the 2015 Severe Storm (Public Law 114-113). In January 2021, the State received \$4,598,000 in additional mitigation funding to address unmet disaster recovery need. This was in response to the damage from Hurricane Florence (Public Law 115-123), which was not captured in the original Mitigation Grant award. In total, the people of South Carolina will be awarded \$217,822,000, with the State being responsible for \$162,188,000 of the awarded grants. Of this \$162,188,000, a minimum of \$50,978,000 must be spent in or for HUD-identified MID counties from the initial Public Law. Additionally, a minumum of \$2,299,000 must be spent in MID counties from the 2018 Hurricane Florence disaster, which include Dillon, Horry, and Marion counties. The remainder will be spent in counties identified as either SC-MID or HUD-MID.



With this grant, the State seeks to enhance mitigation efforts within the Pee Dee and Santee Watershed Area and prevent future avoidable flood damage. Part of this award will go towards mitigation for houses threatened by flooding. The State will create a buyout program to purchase flood-threatened houses and transform the land into protective flood plains. The State will provide funding and oversight to qualified units of general local government (UGLG) applicants. The program will primarily target the Low-to-Moderate Income (LMI) community with its housing efforts, as they are often unequally affected by storm damage. At the same time, it will aid those who display an Urgent Need (UN) to leave Flood-prone areas, especially if it helps the community at large. The State is cognizant of the difficulties of relocating to a new home and will allow for UGLGs to offer Housing Incentives to the LMI community when applicable. Once the houses have been bought out, the State plans to make the land ineligible for further development through conservation easements and transfer the land to another governmental, non-profit, or other entities. This will expand the drainage capacity of the local watershed and help protect the nearby community.

Additionally, some CDBG-MIT Grant funds will go towards infrastructure projects of applying UGLGs. Infrastructure projects must have or surpass a 1.0 Benefit Cost Analysis (BCA). Exceptions may be made for projects which primarily help the LMI community and have benefits that aren't captured by the BCA. The state will oversee the application and building process. Grant funds will also be made available for eligible FEMA-HMGP fund matching. The CDBG-MIT funds can be counted as the UGLG's portion of their match for FEMA-HMGP projects. The State will oversee the application process for providing these funds for the UGLG's FEMA-HMGP projects.

Also, a portion of the grant will go towards assisting UGLG's fund Hazard Mitigation Plans and flood reduction studies and maps. Some local governments may lack or have older flood maps or Hazard Mitigation Plans. By arming these UGLGs with up-to-date flood maps and Hazard Mitigation Plans, they will be able to make better informed decisions about developing near flood plains and be better prepared for future disasters.

## **Overall Progress Narrative:**

This Quarterly Progress Report (QPR) is the 9th published for grant number P-18-SC-45-MIT1, which includes grants B-DP-18-45-0001 and B-DT-19-0001, by the state of South Carolina, who is the first amongst its 2015 CDBG-DR cohort to finish their grant. The South Carolina Office of Resilience through the South Carolina Disaster Recovery Division (the State) will discuss its progress between 1 October and 31 December in the QPR below. The efforts of the State reflect a grant it received from the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) to help mitigate risks associated with the natural disasters that occurred nationwide in 2015, 2016, 2017, and 2018.

The State of South Carolina received \$162,188,000 in Community Development Block Grant  $\tilde{A}$ ¢ $\hat{A}$ è $\hat{A}$ è Mitigation (CDBG-MIT) funds to increase flood and storm mitigation within the 18 HUD and State identified Most Impacted and Distressed (MID) counties. As part of Amendment 2 to the Action Plan, the State has changed how it allocated funds across its 4 program pillars. Currently, \$100 million is dedicated to Infrastructure projects, \$37,318,892.59 is dedicated to Buyout Programs, \$2,681,107.41 is dedicated to matching federal programs, and \$14,078,600 is dedicated to Planning, which includes Plans and Studies. These programs will either be run by the State or by the applying subrecipient.

As of December 31st, the State has awarded \$100,441,876.54 to Units of General Local Government and other state agencies, approximately 62% of the \$162 million mitigation funds. Additionally, the State has allocated \$51,635,578.50, approximately 32% of the total grant, to benefit Low to Moderate Income communities. The increased award amount is largely thanks to the recent application period for Buyout Programs, which led to 3 new projects receiving awards this quarter. The State continues to review Plans and Studies applications on a rolling, yearlong basis, with 1 project being approved this quarter. It will host another Infrastructure application period during April and May of this year. The Federal-Funded Matching pillar is no longer accepting applications and has awarded 100% of its budget as of Amendment 2 to the Action Plan. During this Quarter, it approved 3 Plans and Studies project and 1 Federal Funds Matching project. Due to one of the Plans and Studies project being approved right before the end of the quarter, it will be added in DRGR next quarter.

Additional budget changes occurred in conjunction with the Amendment 2 changes. The majority of Matching activities had a 2.5 percent buffer built into the DRGR budget that was removed. The buffer was part of an older strategy to address project over runs and budget concerns when the grant first started out. Since then, the State has adopted a spread out phase-based system for its bigger budget Infrastructure and Buyout projects and will utilize change orders to address project budget overruns. Since the 2.5 percent buffer was on top of the awarded amount and only reflected in the DRGR budget, its removal will have zero effect on the award amount for projects. Combined with the Amendment 2 changes, the removal of the buffer created several negative budget changes that can be seen in the financial portion of the QPR.

Section 3 reporting under the new CFR 24 Part 75 rules is now being done through the Quarterly Progress Report in the Disaster Recovery Grant Reporting system. The State will be responsible for reporting all labor hours, Section 3 labor hours, and Targeted Section 3 hours in the QPR. Section 3 hours will be reported in their respective activities. This quarter, one project qualified as a Section 3 project with reportable hours.

The State continues to take action to affirmatively further fair housing throughout our CDBG-DR and CDBG-MIT programs by consistently showing concentrated efforts to serve the LMI population. In addition to serving the LMI population, the State continues to prioritize the needs of the elderly, disabled, and female-headed households.

## **Activity Description:**

Since 2015, there have been three presidentially-declared disasters: 2015 Hurricane Joaquin, 2016 Hurricane Matthew, and 2018 Hurricane Florence. The bulk of the damage was not due to wind or storm surge, but from flooding. Due to a lack of flood maps or topographic changes, a significant number of homes were developed in what is now identified as the flood plain. While some homes are able to, at great cost, elevate or mitigate their flood risk; many, including the LMI community, face difficulty in storm proofing their homes or recovering from flood damage. Additionally, once identified as being within a flood zone or having been flood damaged, the homeowner faces great difficulty in selling their property at its pre-damage worth and moving to a safer location nearby. In order to preemptively lower the damage and costs to homes, communities, and local governments, the State is providing funding for units of general local government (UGLG) to buy out homes from the LMI community or those displaying an Urgent Need.

The buyout program, which has seen great success in other cities and states, seeks to achieve two main objectives. First, it seeks to lower or eliminate future damage and costs by investing in buying out homes in the flood plain. This will allow the bought-out homeowners to move to a safer location in the nearby community. LMI homeowners will be able to apply for moving assistance through a housing incentive that will help prevent them from being displaced with no property ownership. Second, once the houses are bought out, the UGLGs will demolish the homes and transform the land into part of the flood plain. This will assist the nearby community, as it increases the absorption of the nearby watershed and helps protect neighboring buildings. Once



demolished, a covenant will be tied to the land that prevents any non-recreational future development. The UGLGs will retain ownership of the land and its maintenance responsibilities. If they desire, the land and its maintenance responsibilities can be transferred to other entities.

This activity will describe the application progress of the Buyout Program. A new activity will be created in DRGR each time the State awards a UGLG funds for their Buyout Activity.

The Mitigation Steering Committee met during Quarter 4 2022 to review and approve Buyout projects. As a result, 3 new Buyout activities and 1 project recategorization from Federal Funds Matching were approved. As of December 31st, the State has awarded \$36.3 million, approximately 97 percent of its total Buyout budget, to 7 Buyout projects. During this Quarter, the Mitigation Action Plan Amendment 2 was created, which transferred funds from the Federal Funds Matching pillar to the Buyout Pillar.

## **Activity Description:**

The Town of Cheraw was awarded \$1,747,680.00 by the State for their Buyout program. The program seeks to lower housing stock from the 100 year floodplain that has been damaged by flooding from previous storms or are likely to be flooded from future storms. Applicants will receive an offer for the home's pre-storm damage fair market value and possibly receive a moving incentive. Once the house has been purchased, it will be demolished with a non-development covenant emplaced. This program seeks to reduce the housing stock that's at risk for serious flood damage, allow the homeowner to move to housing that's safer, and increases the floodplain, which will help reduce the risk of flooding nearby.

### **Activity Description:**

This Activity will cover all program planning actions for the Mitigation Grant and its activities. Planning funds will also be used to pay for Hazard or Flood plans produced for both the State and its units of general local government (UGLG)s. Additionally, in preparation for the Mitigation Grant, the State contracted with AECOM to



produce a watershed study of the Pee Dee and Santee regions, which received the most flood damage from our previous storms. This watershed study will be used to help guide future decisions concerning buyout and infrastructure projects. The Plans and Studies that have received awards from the State are listed below:

#### South Carolina Emergency Management Division's Hazard Identification and Risk Assessment

The Statewide Hazard Identification and Risk Assessment (HIRA) seeks to collect data and analyze it to better understand the impacts of disaster events within the State. This assessment will help inform goals and objectives that will guide state agencies in determining mitigation actions and prioritizing projects that most effectively reduce harm to life and property. Conducting the HIRA is a requirement to completing the State Hazard Mitigation Plan Update, which must be up to date in order to participate in FEMA Hazard Mitigation programs. The South Carolina Emergency Management Division (SCEMD) has been awarded \$109,030 in CDBG-MIT funds. In total, SCEMD expects to spend \$400,000 to complete the HIRA.

#### Marion County Stormwater Master Plan

In March 2021, Marion County's Stormwater Master Plan was awarded \$500,000.00 by the State. Marion County has dealt with significant flooding caused by storms and the confluences of the Great Pee Dee, Little Pee Dee, and Lumber Rivers. The plan seeks to identify flooding issues throughout the county, assess the stormwater system within the county, and eventually use this information to identify and develop mitigation infrastructure projects that can alleviate flooding. Following the completion of the Stormwater Master Plan, Marion will use the information and data acquired to prepare for future infrastructure projects. The creation of the plan will be administered by the State. Marion County is a HUD-identified Most Impacted and Distressed County.

#### Town of Pamplico Stormwater Study

The State awarded \$500,000 to the Town of Pamplico's Stormwater Study. The activity will be administered by the State, who will utilize contractors to analyze data and create stormwater models. The project will involve collecting GIS and Survey data to create hydrologic and hydraulic models of 2, 10, 50, and 100 year 24 hour storm events. Currently, old and inadequately sized stormwater structures allow for runoff to stand in roadways and surrounding properties during storms with heavy precipitation. The findings of the study will be used to identify infrastructure projects that can address this problem. The town of Pamplico is located in Florence County, a HUD Identified MID County.

### Town of Mayesville Stormwater Study

The Town of Mayesville was awarded \$105,000 for its Stormwater Study. This activity will be administered by the State, who will utilize contractors to create a hydrology study to understand the movement and distribution of stormwater within the incorporated area of Mayesville. The Town of Mayesville is located between tyear flood zones and faces inadequate drainage during major storms, which cause flood damage to town facilities and private property, as well as creating hazardous conditions for its residents. This study will later be used to identify future flood mitigation projects. The town of Mayesville is located in Sumter County, a HUD Identified MID County.

#### City of Conway Stormwater Master Plan

The City of Conway was awarded \$305,000 for its Stormwater Master Plan. This activity will be administered by the City Subrecipient. The City will contract with an engineering firm to inventory and survey the existing storm drainage system, delineate watersheds, create hydraulic modeling of 2 through 100 year 24 hour storm events, and create a final report that will highlight problem areas and include recommendations for improving the stormwater system. The City of Conway is located in Horry County, a HUD Identified MID County.

### City of Florence Stormwater Master Plan

The City of Florence was awarded \$500,000 for its Stormwater Master Plan project. This plan will replace the City's outdated 1974 Stormwater master plan, which is based on outdated development trends, technologies, and stormwater mitigation strategies of the time. Additionally, the city has developed significantly since the 1974 plan and is need of an up to date Stormwater Master Plan. Within recent years, Hurricanes and major storms have caused flooded roadways, impeded emergency response, and caused public and private property damage. The Stormwater Master Plan will be used to inform the City of future projects that could mitigate their current flooding issues. The City of Florence will administer this activity as a subrecipient. The City of Florence is located in Florence County, a HUD Identified MID County.

### **Darlington County Watershed Study**

Darlington County's Watershed Study seeks to analyze local flooding from stormwater, local stream and creeks, and ground inundation, as well as identify and develop mitigation plans and projects. The study will encompass the county and impact approximately 66,618 residents. While local groups have attempted to complete watershed studies in smaller communities, a county-wide study led by local government has not been conducted. The State will administer this Watershed Study and has assigned it a budget of \$300,000. The LMI percentage for the area is 41.43%. Darlington is a State-identified MID county.

#### The City of Orangeburg's Stormwater Drainage Study

The City of Orangeburg seeks to conduct a Stormwater Drainage Study that will determine future improvement projects within LMI areas of the city. Previously, these areas have suffered from frequent and repetitive damages to their homes and properties from stormwater. The study will focus exclusively on the LMI areas which include crucial roadways around Magnolia Street and John C. Calhoun Boulevard, and the Railroad Corner. The study will beneficially impact around 12,861 people. The Study will be conducted by the State and is assigned a budget of \$300,000. The LMI percentage of the study's area is 54%. The City of Orangeburg is



located in a State-identified MID county.

The Town of Summerton's Hydraulic and Hydrology Study

The Town of Summerton's seeks to conduct a hydraulic and hydrology study to bettrudrstand the movement and distribution of stormwater within the incorporated area of the town and to identify future mitigation projects that can address possible flood and storm damage. The LMI percentage of the study is 69%. The Study's budget is set at \$150,000 and will be administered by the State. Summerton is located in Clarendon, a HUD-identified MID county.

#### The Citadel's Multi-Hazard Mitigation Plan Update

The Citadel is a Military College located in Charleston, SC. It is seeking to update its Multi-Hazard Mitigation Plan which was originally written and adopted in 2017. In order to maintain its Disaster Resistance University Status and remain eligible for future disaster relief funding, the Multi-Hazard Mitigation Plan must be updated every five years. The Plan is expected to cost \$44,000. The Citadel will contribute \$11,000 to the project, with the State providing \$33,000. The location of the study is in Charleston, a Hud-identified MID county.

The Georgetown and Williamsburg Counties Hydrologic and Hydraulic Study

The Georgetown and Williamsburg Counties Hydrologic and Hydraulic study seeks to assess the existing drainage conditions and identify improvements throughout both counties. Specifically, this study will assess the existing drainage systems, develop, assess, and prioritize projects, and establish an implementation strategy for such projects that will improve the drainage system and mitigate against future flooding throughout Georgetown and Williamsburg Counties. The State will administer this study and has awarded the project \$900,750. The area covered by this study is located in HUD-identified Most Impacted and Distressed Counties.

#### Georgetown County Comprehensive Plan

The Georgetown County Comprehensive Plan with Resilience Element seeks to address how the county responds and reacts towards hazardous situations and/or events. The resilience element will focus on the main natural threats the county faces, such as hurricanes, king tides, severe thunderstorms, land subsidence, erosion, salt water intrusion, and more. The project will help inform the county and its citizens on ways to help mitigate future threats. This plan will be administered by the subrecipient and was awarded \$30,000 by the State. The area covered by this plan is located in a HUD-identified Most Impacted and Distressed County.

Horry County Buck Creek and Simpson Creek Watersheds Hydrologic and Hydraulic Study

Horry County's Buck Creek and Simpson Creek Watersheds Hydrologic and Hydraulic Study will focus on one of the three main focus areas from Horry County's Flood Resilience Master Plan. It seeks to identify potential projects that will improve the drainage system and reduce potential flood impacts throughout the Buck Creek and Simpson Creek Watersheds. The study will identify and prioritize a list of projects that include traditional infrastructure projects and natural stormwater solutions that could include projects that remove existing structures from the landscape and reclaim natural areas. This study will be administered by the Subrecipient and has been awarded \$750,000 by the State. The area covered by the study is located in a HUD-identified Most Impacted and Distressed County.

#### Orangeburg County Hydrologic and Hydraulic Study

Orangeburg County's Hydrologic and Hydraulic Study seeks to examine flooding issues and identify projects that can reduce future damage. The study will assess existing drainage systems; develop, assess, and prioritize projects; and establish an implementation strategy for such projects that will improve the drainage system and mitigate against future flooding throughout Orangeburg County. This study will be run by the State and has been awarded \$450,000. The area covered by the study is located in a South Carolina-identified Most Impacted and Distressed County.

#### Town of James Island Creek Basin Drainage Master Plan

The Town of James Island is seeking to create a Hydrologic and Hydraulic Study that will aid in the creation of a Drainage Master Plan. The study will focus on the James Island Creek Basin, which was identified as a priority in a previous study. The result of this plan will be the development of a stormwater management plan for that basin that can be used to inform future programs and projects. The State has awarded the project \$150,000 and will administer the study. The Town of James Island is located in Charleston County, a HUD identified Most Impacted and Distressed County.

# Chesterfield County Hydrologic and Hydraulic Study

Chesterfield County seeks to create a Hydrologic and Hydraulic Study to assess existing drainage conditions across the county, with a specific focus on the towns of Chesterfield and Patrick. Additionally, it will be used to develop, assess, and prioritize potential projects and establish an implementation strategy that will improve drainage and mitigate against future flooding. This study will be run by the State and has been awarded \$500,000. Chesterfield is a South Carolina identified Most Impacted and Distressed County.

#### Calhoun County Hydrologic and Hydraulic Study

Calhoun County seeks to create a Hydrologic and Hydraulic Study to address inadequate road drainage and flooding throughout the county. The county has identified tow focus areas, the Town of Cameron and the unincorporated community of Sandy Run. The State has awarded this study \$350,000 and will administer the



study. Calhoun is a South Carolina identified Most Impacted and Distressed County.

Town of Lamar Stormwater Master Plan

This project will cover the Town of Lamar's Stormwater Master Plan, which seeks to address decades of severe flooding. The plan will identify and quantify existing flood conditions throughout the town and recommend mitigation solutions and projects that would minimize or eliminate flooding.

This project will occur in a South Carolina-identified Most Impacted and Distressed County. The State awarded the project \$145,200.00 and will administer the study.

Town of Society Hill Stormwater Master Plan

This project will cover the Town of Society Hill Stormwater Master Plan, which seeks to address decades of severe flooding. The plan will identify and quantify existing flood conditions throughout the town and assist the town in identifying and quantifying storm water projects that will minimize or eliminate flooding within the town.

This project will occur in a South Carolina-identified Most Impacted and Distressed County. The State awarded the project \$138,800.00 and will administer the study.

In addition, Community Outreach and Input will be addressed within this activity. In preparation for the grant, the State held 4 public hearings in the Mitigation Grant counties in order to receive public input. The State also strives to meet monthly for its Stakeholder meetings in order to inform its government agency partners, assisting volunteer organizations, and the general public about the CDBG-DR and CDBG-MIT programs run by the State.

#### **Location Description:**

The Mitigation Grant will serve counties selected by HUD and the State that received significant damage from recent storms. HUD Most Impacted and Distressed (HUD MID): Charleston, Clarendon, Dorchester, Florence Georgetown, Horry, Marion, Sumter, Dillon, and Williamsburg

South Carolina Most Impacted and Distressed (SC MID): Berkeley, Calhoun, Chesterfield, Darlington, Lee, Marlboro, and Orangeburg.

# **Activity Progress Narrative:**

This quarter, the State awarded 1 new Plans and Studies project in December. More information about the Santee Lynch COG Hazard Mitigation Plan Update will be updated in the Activity description next quarter. Around \$6.4 million has been awarded to 21 projects for State Agencies and UGLGs across South Carolina for Plans and Studies, which is approximately 46 percent of the assigned budget for this activity.

The Citadel's Hazard Mitigation Plan Update's engineering firm has completed the Hazard Identification and Risk Assessment draft and is awaiting comments and revisions from the Hazard Mitigation Planning Committee. This draft update will include hazard identification and review of existing hazards, hazard profiles, asset inventory, and priority risk indices. Next quarter, the firm will be scheduling the third Hazard Mitigation Planning Committee Meeting to review Capability Assessment, Plan goals and objectives, and review mitigation actions.

The Town of Summerton's Hydrology Study, while still within its period of performance, has ran into some delays. The Alternatives Analysis Report had a late December deadline but has not yet been submitted. The State's Program Coordinator is working with the firm to figure out a new deadline. Nonetheless, the Hydrology study is moving forward, having completed its project administration, meetings, data gathering, field survey, and Existing Conditions Report phases. Next Quarter, the State anticipates the project entering the beginning of its closeout phase.

Darlington County's Watershed Study has completed its data gathering, initial public and stakeholder meetings, field survey, and Existing Conditions Report. The State anticipates the study coming to a close soon, as the Alternatives Analysis Report and Briefing, Project Recommendations and LMI Assessment, and Final Report and Briefing are currently being work on.

The Town of Pamplico's Stormwater Study is in the middle of its closeout phase and has completed all work related to the study. It anticipates closing the project in the near future.

The City of Florence Stormwater Masterplan remains on schedule. City staff has documented all of the known areas of known flooding and provided them to their consultant. Engineering consulted has reviewed all historical data, including the 1970s stormater report, work orders, and etc to compile the draft of the first phase of the masterplan. City staff is currently reviewing the draft prior to submitting it to the State. As of this quarter, they have done a historical review, Hydraulic and Hydrologic Modeling, drafted the first phase of the Masterplan, and developed an interactive website and informational video. Next quarter, they hope to finalize their review of the first phase draft and send it to the State, proceed with the second portion of the masterplan, and hold public meetings within 3 districts of the City of Florence.



The Georgetown and Williamsburg Hydrologic and Hydraulic study is in the Stakeholder and Public Meetings phase. Two stakeholder meetings were conducted on January 5th, with the first in Williamsburg and the second in Georgetown. Six additional meetings will occur throughout the two counties in January as well. Currently, the selected firm is working on its poject administration and meetings, stakeholder engagement, and public engagement and public meetings tasks. Next quarter, the firm anticipates wrapping up on the public and stakeholder meeting phase, completing the identification of focus areas, and beginning work towards the Existing Conditions Report.

The Georgetown Comprehensive Plan is currently undergoing its Request for Qualifications process. The County signed the subrecipient agreement earlier this quarter.

The City of Conway Stormwater Master Plan's contractor has provided a draft final report, exhibits, and cost estimates during this quarter. Next quarter, the contracted firm will summarize the results and make final recommendations along with the environmental review. Most of the remaining work consists of hydraulic modeling and BCA preparation. The final recommendations will include a detailed BCA that will be used in ranking future projects. The contractor anticipates delivering the final report to the city next quarter.

The Horry County Buck Creek and Simpson Creek Watersheds Hydraulic and Hydrologic study is still within the procurement negotiation phase. Horry County has been communicating with the State about the project's funding.

The Marion County Stormwater Master Plan has completed all milestones and is in the middle of closeout.

The City of Orangeburg Hydrology Study's contracted firm has received an extension till January 2023. Currently, the firm has completed the Project Administration and Meetings, Existing Conditions Report, Alternatives Analysis Report, and Project Recommendations and LMI Assessment phases. It is working on its final milestone, the Final Report. Next Quarter, the Study is expected to enter project closeout.

The Orangeburg County Hydrology Study has completed its initial kick off, stakeholder, and public meetings, as well as data gathering. The contracted firm is working on its Existing Conditions Report and Alternatives Analysis Report tasks. Because of milestone delays, the firm has been tasked to either provide a plan to expedite the remainder of the study or submit a project extension request.

The Town of Mayesville Stormwater Study has completed its Data gathering, initial meetings, Existing Conditions Report, and Alternatives Analysis Report milestones. While the project is slightly behind schedule, the contractor anticipates delivering its Project Recommendations and LMI Assessments in early January. The project is expected to complete its remaining tasks band begin closeout next quarter.

The South Carolina Emergency Management HIRA is proceeding on schedule and is wrapping up any loose ends with the hazard analysis.

The Town of James Island Creek Basin Drainage Master Plan is in the negotiation phase with the selected firm about an appropriate scope of work and project cost. The State anticipates that the contract will be executed and kick off will begin next quarter.

The Chesterfield County Hydrologic and Hydraulic Study project is hosting 4 public meetings in January and has already held the kickoff and stakeholder meetings. The contractor is currently sending out mailers about the project and is in the middle of its Data Gathering phase. Next quarter, they anticipate completing its first milestone and beginning Site Assessments.

The Calhoun County Hydrologic and Hydraulic Study underwent its Request for Qualifications and procurement phase this quarter. The State and its selected firm are working through project scope and negotiations. Next quarter, it anticipates executing the contract with the selected firm and kicking off the project.

The Town of Lamar Stormwater Masterplan is in the middle of its procurement phase. Short list interviews are expected to occur in January. Next quarter, the State anticipates selecting a firm, holding contract negotiations, and executing the project contract, as well as project kickoff occurring.

Town of Society Hill Stormwater Masterplan is in the middle of its procurement phase. Short list interviews are expected to occur in January. Next quarter, the State anticipates selecting a firm, holding contract negotiations, and executing the project contract, as well as project kickoff occurring.

Town of Pinewood Hydrologic and Hydraulic study is in the middle of its procurement phase. Short list interviews are expected to occur in January. Next quarter, the State anticipates selecting a firm, holding contract negotiations, and executing the project contract, as well as project kickoff occurring.



Santee-Lynches COG Hazard Mitigation Plan Update was awarded \$80,650 by the Mitigation Special Case Panel in December. The Santee Lynches Council of Governments is one of ten regional, sub-state districts within South Carolina and is comprised of Clarendon, Kershaw, Lee, and Sumter counties. This project will focus on updating their FEMA approved Hazard Mitigation Plan, which is currently out of date and risks creating further community vulnerability from Natural Hazard Events.

The State will continue to receive, review, and approve Plans and Studies project applications on a year-round basis.

The State is hosting its monthly stakeholder meetings online through Zoom.

Adjustments were made to the Responsible Organization Expenditures to reflect the earlier transfer of responsibilities from the South Carolina Department of Administration to the South Carolina Office of Resilience. This does not change the total amount of expenditures, which remains equal to the amount of draw downs.

This activity will cover the usage of CDBG-MIT funds to help units of general local government (UGLG)s meet their cost-sharing requirements for federal matching programs, such as FEMA's Hazard Mitigation Grant Program (HMGP), Building Resilient Infrastructure and Communities (BRIC), and Flood Mitigation Assistance (FMA). ### **Activity Description:**

This activity will cover the Federal Funds Match for Georgetown County Andrews Local Flood Reduction Study. Phase I of the study was completed in November 2020, which consisted of a feasibility study, Hydraulic and Hydrologic model, and design drawings. Phase II will include demolition of existing stormwater infrastructure when applicable and the construction of an improved storm drainage system, which will involve adding new pipe, installing new drainage ditches, manholes, and inlets. Additionally Phase II will include installing



sidewalks, improving existing drainage ditches, and repairing roads. The total cost for the project will be \$4,885,368, with the FEMA HMGP Federal cost share consisting of \$3,664,026. The Local cost share for this project is \$1,221,342. The State will contribute \$1,136,865, with Georgetown being responsible for the remaining cost share.

### **Activity Description:**

Francis Marion has been awarded grants by the Economic Development Administration and the State to replace and upsize the stormwater infrastructure around its campus in six areas. This action was recommended after analysis by AECOM determined that non-action would result in adverse environmental conditions and that maintenance on the current infrastructure would not result in sufficient stormwater management. The original total project cost is estimated to be \$874,279, with 80% of the Federal Cost Share being \$699,279 and the remaining 20% of the non-Federal Cost Share being \$175,000. The State will provide the non-Federal Cost Share match. The project will occur at Francis Marion University in Florence County, a HUD-identified Most



Impacted and Distressed County. The project will be administered by the Subrecipient. 2022 UPDATE:

Francis Marion University's received additional EDA funds and has increased the scope of the project. The new total project costs is now \$1,942,497.00, with the Federal Cost Share being \$1,499,279.00. The State is now contributing \$443,218.00 to the project's Local Cost Share.

#### **Activity Progress Narrative:**

Bid documents for the project were approved by the EDA in late October, with the advertisement of bids beginning on October 31st, which can be found on the SCBO website and the facilities management page of the Francis Marion University website. Three sealed bids were received. The preconstruction conference was scheduled for January 13th. Francis Marion received additional funds from the EDA to increase the scope of their project. After review and approval, the State decided to increase their contribution to the local match as well. Additionally, the Responsible Organization Expenditures were edited to better reflect who the exact subrecipient is. This resulted in no changes to the total expenditure amount.

Two major budget changes occurred during this quarter. The first was the change order to increase the CDBG-MIT award amount from \$175,000 to \$443,218.00. The second was to remove a 2.5 percent buffer built into the prior budgeted amount within the DRGR activity budget that was originally in place to tackle project budget overruns. Due to how the State has set up its award phases and change order system, it no longer needs the buffer to be in place within the DRGR budget. Rather, handling inevitable project overruns is carefully considered during each phase's award period and the phases are spread out to avoid obligating too much of the grant within close proximity. The award for this project continues to remain the same. Only the 2.5% buffer of \$4,375.00 based on the original award amount was removed.

# **Activity Description:**

In order to increase storm and flood defenses, the State will provide funds for infrastructure projects to units of general local government (UGLG). In order to receive funding, UGLGs must apply with a detailed plan of what their projects and must receive the State's approval of their project. All projects must undergo a Benefit Cost Analysis (BCA) and must meet the requirement scores. An exception to this may be made for projects that provide noteworthy benefits to the LMI community that aren't easily captured by the BCA. The goal of these infrastructure projects is to better protect local communities from preventable flood damage. These projects will be overseen by the State, but administered by UGLGs.

This specific activity will focus on the application process of the UGLG projects and track their progression. All infrastructure funds will be held in this activity until they are allocated to a specific infrastructure project. Once the projects have been approved, a new activity will be created to track the narrative, financial, and statistical progress of the infrastructure project. The State will divide this activity into three funding phases, with the first phase will provide funding for "shovel-ready" projects that can begin relatively soon.

#### **Location Description:**

The Mitigation Grant will serve counties selected by HUD and the State that received significant damage from



recent storms.

HUD Most Impacted and Distressed (HUD MID): Charleston, Clarendon, Dorchester, Florence Georgetown, Horry, Marion, Sumter, Dillon, and Williamsburg

South Carolina Most Impacted and Distressed (SC MID): Berkeley, Calhoun, Chesterfield, Darlington, Lee, Marlboro, and Orangeburg.

#### **Activity Progress Narrative:**

The Mitigation Steering Committee met during Quarter 2 2022 to review and approve Infrastructure projects from Phase 1 Round 2. During this round, 9 projects were approved. The State currently has approved 20 Infrastructure projects and awarded \$49,881,494.02, approximately 50 percent of the amount allocated to infrastructure. Some of these projects, such as the ones in the City of Dillon, have multiple projects consolidated into one DRGR activity. There are approximately \$50.1 million in remaining funds to be awarded. The next Mitigation application period will occur during April and May 2023.

The Isle of Palms has experience increased occurrences of flooding due to heavy rainfall events, extreme high tides, sea level rise, high-water table conditions, and intense coastal storms. These conditions, combined with an inadequate drainage system and the low lying topography of the island, have create flooding conditions throughout the City. The Infrastructure project will focus on the area surrounding the 41st Avenue Outfall. infrastructure project is classified as Urgent Need and will be administered by the State. The Urgent Need project was awarded \$1,396,700 and will be budgeted at \$1,431,617.50 within DRGR. It is located in a HUD-identified Most Impacted and Distressed County.

### **Activity Progress Narrative:**

The Isle of Palms Stormwater Infrastructure project underwent design modifications and plan updates in 2022. As part of this, they sought to increase the scope of their current project by an additional \$729,100, for a total amount of \$2,125,800. The amendment seeks to further protect critical infrastructure, which includes a fire station, by extending the length of the storm drain pipes by 423 feet to the limits of the right of way of 41st avenue. The amendment was approved by the Mitigation Special Case Panel and will properly be reflected in DRGR next quarter. Additionally, the project contract with Thomas and Hutton was executed on December 30th. Next Quarter, the project will begin preparing for the Environmental Assessment phase, complete designs of the new pipe system, and begin the permit application process.

# **Activity Description:**

UPDATE: Due to similarities in geography, effects, and goals, the Second Street and Washington activities were merged together into the Town of Cheraw's Stormwater Infrastructure Project. Within DRGR, this was done by removing the 5l15 Cheraw Washington activity and merging the finances and narratives to the Second Street activity. This activity was renamed as the Town of Cheraw's Stormwater Infrastructure Project.

The Town of Cheraw, using the information and data obtained from their Stormwater Master Plan, has identified several projects that can reduce damage from flooding and stormwater. The Second Street project area starts at the intersection of Second and Third Street and stops near the intersection of Second and Powe Street. Drainage improvements will include 35 storm drainage structures, 3,246 linear feet of stormwater pipe, 10,814 linear feet of curbing, and 4,773 square yards of required paving/resurfacing and is expected to provide around



155 acres of drainage relief for the town.

Additionally, the Stormwater Master Plan was used to identify another beneficial project at Wasshington Street. This project will begin by upsizing the downstreampipes under the Washington Street dirt road and CSX railroad, with project improvements continuing near the intersection of Front and Marlboro Streets and follow a general path around Church Street. The project will then branch off from the trunk lineat Third Street and end at the intersection of Third and Market Street. The trunk line improvements will end on Green Streetnear Cheraw First Baptist Church. The project will provide approximately 190 acres of drainage relief to the town, which includebuilding 51 storm drainage structures, installing 5,800 linear feet of stormwater pipe, rehabilitating 606 linear feet of preexistingstormwater pipe, and 18,695 square yards of required paving and resurfacing. Combined, the projects were awarded \$9,336,996.18. It is budgeted at \$9,422,845.51 in DRGR.

The Low to Moderate Income focused projects will be administered by the State and will occur within a South Carolina-identified Most Impacted and Distressed County.

Due to project similarities and synergies, the Town of Cheraw Second Street and Town of Cheraw Washington and RR activities have been merged into one activity. The budgets for these two activities have been combined into one in DRGR. This quarter, the State held a public kick off with Davis and Floyd, who was contracted for the engineering services. They completed the survey of the 2nd street project and have begun the survey of Washington and RR. The firm has also conducted the Existing Conditions research and began developing the preliminary plan set. As of quarter end, the project is close to finishing survey work, begun the engineering design and environmental review phases, and started identifying required permits. Next quarter, the State anticipates having the survey and existing conditions research completed, finishing 60 percent or more of the engineering designs, and scheduling at least one public meeting.

# **Activity Description:**

This activity will focus solely on the city of Charleston's Medical District Drainage Tunnel Extension at Ehrhardt Street. The city was awarded \$10,213,294.75 for this infrastructure project by the Governor's Appointed Committee. The area is routinely impacted by substantial flooding that can prevent patients, emergency vehicles, and staff from reaching the hospital during a storm. In just 2019, the medical district had 89 flood events.



The tunnel will run beneath Ehrhardt Street on the Medical University of South Carolina's campus towards President and Cannon Streets. Water will go through this tunnel until it reaches the city's Spring/Fishburne drainage improvement project. The infrastructure project will be run by the city of Charleston. The activity in DRGR has been budgeted for \$1,791,372.00. Charleston is a HUD-identified Most Impacted and Distressed County.

### **Location Description:**

Charleston, SC

#### **Activity Progress Narrative:**

The City of Charleston received its Notice to Proceed on April 4th and has completed mobilization at Ehrhardt Drive, Cannon Street, and Spring Street. This quarter, they completed to concrete placement for President tunnel bulkhead, removed bulkheads and plugged 9 out of 11 temporary outfall connections, commenced tunnel excavation, and coordinated with project stakeholders and the State. Next quarter, they will continue the tunnel excavation. The city hopes to possibly complete tunnel excavation and begin installing the tunnel lining before the end of next quarter.

Since the commencement of construction in 2022, this project will continue to record its labor hours for Section 3 reporting. While the State did not achieve its Section 3 goals for this quarter, it is making strong efforts towards these goals. It is attempting to recruit low income workers through advertising and reaching out to community organizations. Additionally, corrections are being made to include additional labor hours from the third Quarter that were not included. # **Activity Description:**

This Activity will focus on Horry County's Big Bull Landing Road Infrastructure project. Horry County was awarded \$893,750.00 for this project. Bucksport, the community where Big Bull Landing Road is located, receives significant flooding when the Pee Dee backs ups from storms. Horry County seeks to elevate Big Bull Landing Road to the adjacent high point grades that would make flooding less likely. It will also create a levee/dam on the existing drainage feature to prevent backup from the Pee Dee River.



The project will be run by Horry County, which is a HUD-identified Most Impacted and Distressed County. The activity in DRGR has been budgeted for \$916,093.75.

The public notice period for the SC DHEC OCRM CZC permit went from October 21 to November 1st, with the permit awaiting approval. As a result of this public notice, SCOR and SC DHEC received comments from community members and others expressing concerns about the impacts of the projects and the logistics of the project. A public meeting was held on December 8 in Bucksport to address the community concerns, with Horry County, the State, and Thomas and Hutton representatives in attendance. SCDHEC will be conducting a detailed review o the project and will conduct a public hearing in the future. Horry county is meeting with the ACOE to discuss the permitting required for the project.
